Some thoughts follow regarding your thoughts on religious matters. Let me begin by saying I am not your judge nor am I anyone else's judge. Judgment belongs to God. However I can give you opinion or better yet, what I believe regarding this weighty matter. Private conversation with God is always good. He likes to hear from us and interact. I do this often during the day. To be humble is to recognize our dependence on God for all things. So prayer, conversation is always good. I pray for many people, living and deceased, that God pours his graces on them and has mercy on them. We must also bear witness to what we believe and this cannot be done privately. This is done by the way we act and also by our attitude and belief about prayer. This is what others see and come to understand about us. So let me give you some insight if I can about prayer and faith as I see it.

Belief in God must include God's intimate concern and interaction with what he has created. Belief in a loving God also demands that God would not mislead and seeks to be united eternally with his created. We must make the correct decisions, the ones that bring us to God, and not away from Him. Eternity is an awful long time to be wrong.
